

Responses from Bonnie Michael

1. Yes or no, do you agree that there should be no significant new traffic introduced into the Colonial Hills neighborhood? How will you ensure this in the future?

As talk continues with “I Am Boundless”, it is important to ensure that there will be no automobile connection between Indianola Ave and Dublin Granville Road. If the new Colonial Hills School is developed on this site, I can envision a loop for parents to drop-off their children, but no roadway that connects this area to SR161. A bicycle/walking path, however, could be a nice addition.

2. What improvements to Colonial Hills do you propose?

Selby Playground is scheduled for replacement in 2020. Funds are budgeted for 2022 in the City’s Capital Improvement Plan or the west side of Selby Park, to include analyzing options for renovating or replacing the Selby Shelter House. The Kenyon Brook sewer line project has been approved for \$2.1M for construction in 2020. This project is designed to alleviate storm water flooding problems during heavy rains. The Northbrook Project needs to be completed and the annual street improvement plan likely will include streets in Colonial Hills. Based on the proposed upgrade to the Worthington water lines, work is anticipated in Colonial Hills area. I support the CHCA plans to renovate the entrance signs.

3. How do you propose to upgrade the water system in Worthington?

1. City Council has funded a study of the City’s water line infrastructure in the 2019 CIP.
2. Engineering consultants are being hired to perform this study called a “Water System Condition Evaluation and Improvement Plan.”
3. The study will commence before the end of 2019 and take about 6 months to complete.
4. The proposed 5-year CIP will show \$500,000 per year from 2021 through 2024 as a budgetary placeholder for water line improvements.

5. The CIP will be modified for FY 2021 based on the specific projects identified in the study.

4. How would you diversify and stabilize the revenue stream in the City of Worthington?

Since over 70% of the City's revenue is income tax, protecting the City's fiscal health is key. We need to continue to develop vibrant economic development programs to ensure the City's fiscal stability and to ensure continued delivery of Worthington's outstanding city services. This can be addressed by working with local businesses, regional collaborations, business venture grants, seeking state and federal funding, and perhaps starting a Worthington Foundation. Plus, we need to safeguard the carryover balance (rainy day fund) to weather any recessions.
